My Dear Fellow Members

As my eighth year as President comes to an end I am immensely proud to present to you my Annual Report covering a remarkable year in our twenty three years of trading. 2015 has been a memorable year of consolidation, growth, change, sporting achievement and financial success.

Our growth in membership to almost 16,000 (which has since increased to 17,000) and our record operating net profit of \$1,186,274 are clear indicators that your club is in a healthy financial position but your Board of Directors and Management are well aware of the competitive nature of our industry and the need to continue to modify and fine tune our operations to achieve ongoing success.

As I have said in previous years what we have achieved in 2015 is again from a collective team effort within our Club involving Board of Directors, Management, Staff and Members together contributing to our growth and success.

I thank my fellow Directors for the respect and support I receive as Chairman and for their commitment to the Club. As you are aware the number of Directors was reduced this year to seven (7) and I am very pleased to report to you that under the new structure the Board operated in a very professional and more effective manner.

Over the past eight (8) years in my role as President I have worked in very close consultation with our CEO Mark Chaffey. A major contributor to our success is certainly the initiative, guidance and vision he provides to the Board and his Management team but what I have personally experienced is his absolute dedication to The Entrance Leagues Club, his commitment to our community profile and his passion for professionalism and success in the Senior and Junior Rugby League arenas. I thank you Mark for your friendship and loyalty.

A special mention must be made of our Brasserie staff who have endured a difficult period of renovation and change but, thanks to Jason and his staff, are currently on a wave of success. From the positive feedback from members and my own personal experience I thoroughly recommend you try the current fare — it's sensational.

To all our sporting and associate members thank you sincerely for your patronage and support throughout the year. As President it is so rewarding to see the large number of individual members, groups and families now attending the club on a regular basis and using the facilities sometimes for functions or just to spend a few hours relaxing with friends.

Thank you also to our members who are players, supporters and officials of The Entrance Rugby League Football Club, The Entrance Junior Rugby League Football Club, Golden Hind Women's Bowling Club, Men's Social Bowls Club, Darts Club, Social Golf Club and Netball Club and our sponsor clubs, Killarney Vale Kripples Soccer Club, The Entrance Senior and Junior Cricket Club and The Entrance Rams Rugby Club. You are all part of our Leagues Club "family" and your ongoing patronage fosters stronger relationships in line with our objectives.

In 2015 our sole Senior Rugby League focus was the development and performance of our teams in the Central Coast Division and I would like to commend Football Committee President Mick Bates. Vice Presidents Peter Lawler and John Atkins and the remainder of the Committee for their full support of the Board's decision. In an outstanding year all teams were highly competitive winning the Club Championship, in their inaugural year the young Ladies League Tag team finished strongly finally succumbing in the Grand Final to an impressive Kincumber outfit and the 1st and Reserve Grade sides both won Premierships with dominant second half displays of quality football. A fantastic season for the Tigers and I congratulate the coaches, support staff, volunteers and all players involved together with Mick Bates and his Committee. Much to the dismay of Wyong and the other clubs "we're back" as a force on the Central Coast and whilst it's

always a tough task defending premierships every endeavour will be made to maintain a strong playing roster and provide the development opportunities for our talented local "home-grown" young Tigers.

Speaking of "home-grown" young Tigers our Juniors have again excelled being awarded the Most Successful Club on the Coast for the third year in a row with nine (9) teams contesting Grand Finals resulting in four (4) Premierships, in the Under 11/1, Under 13/1, Under 15/1 and Under 16/1. In all only two (2) teams failed to make the finals, quite an amazing result largely attributed to the Juniors strategic approach to coaching and development which is to be expanded to accommodate additional skills. Based on these results some talented youngsters will be emerging from the Junior ranks in coming years and I congratulate President Mat Watson and his Committee and Head Coach Matt Sharman on these outstanding achievements.

Again thank you to our sponsors who appear in the in-house advertising and are listed in this Annual Report booklet. Their generous contributions allow us to provide the professional level of football operations that is so essential in the current Rugby league arena. Please give them your support.

The recent renovations including the impressive new Entry Portico, Car Park upgrade with improved pedestrian and vehicle access and Outdoor Gaming Area expansion have been well received by members and visitors with very positive comments about the "welcoming" feel of the Club which we strive to maintain.

Our exciting proposal for the construction of an attractive Covered Seating Area at the EDSACC South playing fields was gaining momentum with support from Wyong Council and our State and Federal Government representatives when a senseless act of vandalism resulting in the destruction of the Amenities/Junior Club Room building halted the proposal. As I prepare this report we are awaiting Council's decision on the remaining structure. Options are of course to rebuild using the remaining structure or to locate the facilities under the Covered Seating Area in a Grandstand type building. Obviously difficult times ahead for Senior and Junior

football whatever the decision but rest assured that the Leagues Club will provide the support necessary and remains committed to either proposal.

I sincerely thank David Mehan MP State Member for The Entrance and Karen McNamara MP Federal Member for Dobell who have both met with us to discuss the proposals and have accordingly pledged their full support.

During 2015 we lost a passionate Tiger stalwart and distinguished Life Member, Mick Tattam. Mick will be sadly missed but fondly remembered by those he befriended throughout his lengthy association with The Entrance Tigers. I have prepared a tribute to Mick which appears elsewhere in this Annual Report.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, Management and Staff thank you to all our loyal members for your patronage. Please continue to enjoy your facilities and best wishes to all for a healthy and successful 2016.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S report Mark Chaffey



It is with pleasure to present my report to the Members of The Entrance Leagues Club and thank our Members for their continued support of their Club for the year ending September 30th, 2015.

During the year, significant progress was made in the Boards Strategic Plan with the Club Refurbishment, Alfresco Gaming extension, new Club Entry and additional Car Parking completed, with great feedback received from Members and Visitors to date. Despite these works taking place, your Club achieved a record profit figure of \$1,186,274.00, which is a considerable increase on the 2014 profit of \$523,181.00.

In analysing the accounts, I would like to highlight the following;

- Membership increased to 15,925 compared to
- Revenue increased to \$14,146,682 compared to \$13,369,667
- Depreciation and Amortisation \$1,642,964 compared to \$1,557,794
- Poker Machine Tax, Licences, Donations \$1,788,989 compared to \$1,578,867

Good financial results are important but are only part of the job of managing your Club for your benefit. Ongoing changes to legislation and increased competition impact on Club operations, meaning every year the Management team and Staff are faced with a whole new range of challenges. The way that they embrace these challenges and ensure that customer service is maintained at the highest level possible, whilst inconvenience to Members is kept at a minimum, is a remarkable effort and I thank all of our Staff for a great effort throughout the year.

The same can be said of your Board of Directors; as much as their meetings are structured to fall in line with the Clubs Constitution and Corporate Governance objectives, there are always new and varied matters to test their business sense. More importantly, their knowledge of what you the Member wants from your Club and to that end I believe your Board is getting it right and the future looks bright under their guidance. Thanks must go to the entire Board of Directors for their guidance and support throughout the year. It's a difficult job, even without the industry issues, but they manage to remain focussed on the job at hand. In particular David Hart, as his role as Chairman is not always an easy one, but David manages to maintain a positive and objective outlook at all times where it could be easy to fall in line with popular decisions as opposed to discussing and achieving the right result. The reduction in the Board numbers this year has helped achieve a cohesive Board and I look forward to working with you all again in 2016.

A year of change also with The Entrance Tigers RLFC: no team in the NSWRL Ron Massev Cup meant a re-focus on Central Coast Rugby League competition, and what a year of results. Our Football Club President Mick Bates and his Committee need to be congratulated along with all Coaches, Players and Support Staff for the way they went about re-focussing after ending 2014 with a Ron Massey Cup Premiership. The 2015 Season had many expectations, one of which was to achieve a more consistent and combined effort throughout the grades. Well, it couldn't have gone much better, with a Club Championship, all Grades in the Finals, the Ladies League Tag Team making the Grand Final and our First and Reserve Grade teams becoming the 2015 Premiers, in what was a great year on and off the field. Special thanks as always to our great Sponsors and Supporters. Your support of our Football Club is very much appreciated and we look forward to you being on board again in 2016. Please support our fantastic Sponsors listed on the back of this report where and when you can, we couldn't achieve the results both on and off the field without them.

Thanks also to The Entrance Junior RLFC President Mat Watson and his Committee on another successful year for the Junior Club, with many teams in the Finals and Nine (9) Teams in the Grand Finals, well done to all. Your efforts in looking after our future Senior Tigers is very much appreciated and we again look forward to working with you to help you achieve your goals in 2016.

And Mick Tattam was certainly one of the "good ones" providing exemplary service to the Tigers and the game he loved with a passion.

Mick joined the Tigers in 1994 and served as Manager of the top level side with successive Coaches Alan Emery (1994-1995), Tony Brosnan (1996-1998), Matt Parish (1999-2005) and Jamy Forbes (2006-2014). With his astute knowledge of Rugby League and unique people management skills Mick was more than just a Manager providing expert advice when it was needed and being a mentor, counsellor, legal advisor, financial consultant or just simply a friend to the many young men he cared for during his term.

In no small way Mick contributed to, shared in and celebrated five (5) memorable Premierships.

1995 with Alan Emery, 2000 with Matt Parish, 2003 Inaugural Jim Beam Cup with Matt Parish,

2007 Jim Beam Cup with Jamy Forbes and 2014 Ron Massey Cup with Jamy Forbes.

Mick Tattam had many talents but as a Rugby League journalist he was superb. His match reports were comprehensive, colourful and exciting. Mick didn't pull any punches, at times questioning referee's decisions and rule interpretations but the end result was an exciting description of the game. A fine example of Mick's skills can be found in the History of The Entrance Rugby League Football Club compiled by Phil Andrews. With help from Gary Launt, Mick documented the final couple of decades in our history and, as Phil suggests, Mick's commentary is detailed and fascinating.

Along with his talents Mick was a respectful person and a true gentleman. In his final years he displayed amazing courage and will be sadly missed but fondly remembered by those he befriended throughout his lengthy association with The Entrance Tigers.

Operating result

The net profit for the year amounted to \$1,186,274 compared with \$523,181 in the prior year. This result was after charging \$ 1,642,964 (2014:\$ 1,557,794) for depreciation and amortisation.

Objectives

Short-term Objectives

The vision of the Board and Management is to run a successful business, to be profitable and financially sound, to retain a strong family atmosphere and provide family oriented facilities to the local community. An integral part of this vision is also to retain the personal touch that the Club has with its members and to continue to strive for customer service excellence. This is something that both the Board and Management believe will continue to give the Club a competitive edge as it continues to grow in membership numbers and size.

Long-term Objectives

Continue to develop and refine the Club Master Plan, which incorporates, establishing a cyclical refurbishment plan, acquiring additional gaming entitlements, further food options, achieving energy efficiency, upgrading gaming software and implementing a venue wide loyalty programme. These long term objectives will be supported by undertaking continual research of the Club's Key markets to ensure that the Club has a competitive edge in its market. The Club will continue to develop products that will foster stronger relationships with sporting groups, local community and local schools

The strategy for achieving the Club's objectives is to ensure that the Club's Financial Performance is optimised and be able to be monitored by the Board to achieve desired outcomes. Ensuring the profitability of the gaming, and food and beverage sections are maximised through sound management principles and continuing to listen to our members & guests needs and to deliver on these needs.

Performance measurement and key performance indicators

The Club has key performance indicators in place and these key performance indicators are monitored and reviewed on a regular basis to assist and formulate ways to achieve industry benchmark performance in all trading areas of the Club.

Liability of members on winding up

The company is incorporated and domiciled in Australia as a company limited by guarantee. In accordance with the constitution of the company, every member of the company undertakes to contribute an amount limited to \$5 per member in the event of the winding up of the company during the time that he/she is a member or within one year thereafter. At 30 September 2015 there were 15.925 members.

This statement excludes a benefit included in the aggregate amount of emoluments received or due and receivable by directors and shown in the company's accounts, or the fixed salary of a fulltime employee of the company or a related body corporate.

Proceedings on behalf of company

No person has applied for leave of court to bring proceedings on behalf of the company or intervene in any proceedings to which the company is a party for the purpose of taking responsibility on behalf of the company for all or any part of those proceedings. The company was not a party to any such proceedings during the period.

1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Preparation

The Entrance Leagues Club (Reduced Disclosure Requirements) Limited has elected to early adopt the Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards abs AASB 2010-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The company has also adopted AASB 2011-2: Amendments to the Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Trans-Tasman Convergence Project- Reduced Disclosure and AASB 2012-7: Amendments to the Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards- Reduced Disclosure Requirements of Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise. The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts

Accounting Policies

(a) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For The Year Ended 30 September 2015

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (cont'd)

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Donations are recognised as revenue when received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(b) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost. Inventories held for distribution are measured at cost adjusted, when applicable, for any loss of service potential.

(c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Freehold Property

Freehold land is measured on the cost basis. Buildings are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when the impairment indicators are present (refer to note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised lease assets but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate, at end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplusw relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(d) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) that are transferred to the entity, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised, recognising an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the entity will obtain ownership of the asset. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight line basis over the life of the lease term

(e) Financial Instruments

Initial Recognition and Measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the entity commits itself to either purchase or sell that asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss" in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit and loss immediately.

Classification and Subsequent Measurement

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, or cost. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments and reduction for impairment, and adjusted for any cumulative amortisation of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying amount with a consequential recognition of an income or expense item in profit or loss.

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including recent arm's length transactions, reference to simular instruments and option pricing models.

(i) Financial assets at fair value through Profit or loss

Financial assets are classified at "fair value through profit or loss" when they are held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking, derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (cont'd)

when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying amount being included in profit or loss.

(ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

(iv) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either not capable of being classified into other categories of financial assets due to their nature or they are designated as such by management. They comprise investments in the equity of other entities where there is neither a fixed maturity nor fixed or determinable payments.

They are subsequently measured at fair value with any remeasurements other than impairment losses and foreign exchange gains and losses recognised in other comprehensive income. When the financial asset is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss pertaining to that asset previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified into profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets are classified as non-current assets when they are expected to be sold after 12 months from the end of the reporting period. All other available for sale financial assets are classified as current assets.

(v) Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities other than financial guarantees are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial liability is derecognised.

Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets will be deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of the occurrence of one or more events (a "loss event"), which as an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s).

Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expire or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are discharged, cancelled or expired. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party, and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

(f) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount if an asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount.

Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit and loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (e.g. in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment or loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other standard.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Impairment testing is performed annually for goodwill and intangible assets with indefinite lives.

(g) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to

be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows.

(h) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

(i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO).

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

(j) Income Tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under section 23 (g) of the Income Tax Assessment act.

(k) Comparative Figures

When required by accounting standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(I) Trade and other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

(m) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the entity.

(n) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

(o) New accounting standards and interpretations

Certain new accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for 30 September 2015 reporting periods. The Company's assessment of the impact of these new standards and interpretations is that their adoption is not expected to have a material impact on future financial statements.

RESPONSIBLE service of alcohol

The Entrance Leagues Club Policy

It is necessary for this Club to practice responsible service of alcohol for community, legal and health reasons. Irresponsible use of alcohol leads to serious social problems including drunkenness, under age drinking, violence and drink driving.

It is the policy of The Entrance Leagues Club:

- to respect a person's right to consume alcohol responsibly.
- to allow patrons present in the Club to enjoy themselves in a responsible manner.
- to prevent intoxication, violent or quarrelsome behaviour in or around the Club premises.
- to prevent excessive drinking of alcohol by individuals which place themselves, other patrons and the community at risk.
- to refuse service of alcohol to under age persons.

It is illegal for:

- a person on the Club's premises to sell or supply liquor to a person under the age of 18 years on the Club's premises.
- this Club's Licensee to permit intoxication or any indecent, violent or quarrelsome conduct on the Club's premises.
- a person on the Club's premises to sell or supply any liquor to any person on the Club's premises who is at the time intoxicated.
- a person who has been refused entry into the Club, or has been requested to leave the Club, because they are intoxicated, to refuse to quit the Club premises when requested to do so.

Intoxication

May be described as a state in which, through the consumption of alcohol, a person has severely lost the normal control of his or her bodily and mental faculties.

Preventing Intoxication

The Entrance Leagues Club will take all reasonable steps to prevent intoxication on the Club's premises including:

- promoting low alcohol and non-alcoholic drinks
- encouraging patrons to have non-alcoholic drinks between rounds of alcoholic drinks
- promoting food sales
- refusal of service to persons apparently intoxicated

Preventing under age drinking

The Club staff will request proof of age from any person entering the Club, or present in the Club, who appears under age or if there is a doubt about the person being of legal age. The only proof of age acceptable are photo drivers license, proof of age card or passport.

Understanding the Responsible Service of Alcohol Policy

This policy will be displayed throughout the Club and appear in the Club's Journal to ensure patrons are made aware of it. Any person wanting further information or explanation about it, including its implications for patrons, should contact the Duty Manager. All staff are given the opportunity to be trained so that they are made aware of their legal rights and obligations pertaining to responsible service of alcohol, of the provisions of the Club's Responsible Service of Alcohol Policy and the signs of intoxication.

Responsible Conduct of Gaming

The Entrance Leagues Club is totally committed to the practice of Responsible Conduct of Gaming for community, legal and health reasons and to minmise harm and meet community expectations. The Entrance Leagues Club achieves its harm minimisation objective through its gambling operations by having in place a set of rules and procedures to ensure a pleasant and safe gambling environment. A copy of these rules is readily available at the Clubs Reception and is displayed throughout the Club
