## PRESIDENT'S report David Hart



My Dear Fellow Members

As our twenty-fourth year of trading and my ninth term as President concludes I am once again pleased to present my 2016 Annual Report for another year of mixed results.

2016 wasn't a good year for me personally due to a run of different illnesses culminating finally in a necessary extensive leave of absence. During this time Vice President Vince Mitchell took my place and Director Mick Bates filled the role of Vice President. I would like to thank Vince and Mick for stepping into both positions during what was a very busy period.

As Acting President Vince has prepared a separate Annual Report which includes the financial trading results for the year, membership growth, staff performance, support for affiliated clubs and sub clubs and Club Grants and Sporting Sponsorships.

I fully endorse Vince's Report and sincerely thank all of our excellent staff and our sporting and associate members, particularly those involved with our sub clubs, for their contribution to our ongoing success. In a highly competitive market our results again reflect a great team effort by our staff, Board of Directors and loyal members. Thank you to our staff for your dedication and to our members for your patronage and support.

Also a special thank you to our C.E.O. Mark Chaffey for his initiative and guidance and to my fellow Directors for their support and commitment. Vince Mitchell and I will hopefully achieve in 2017 a 25 year service milestone in the Club Industry.

As anticipated the defence of our 2015 Rugby League Premierships proved difficult but all Grades were more than competitive finishing second in the Club Championship and, except for the Open Age team, figuring in the Semi-Finals and Finals. Special congratulations must go to Minor Premiers and Grand Finalists the Reserve Grade and Ladies League Tag Teams. Unfortunately no trophies in 2016 but throughout the season some dominant displays of quality football from all grades.

I commend the Football Committee, coaches, support staff, volunteers, supporters and all players for their involvement and assistance in 2016. It was a difficult season affected by the necessary relocation to the Rugby field and our thanks go to The Entrance Rams for their help. In 2017 we will return to

EDSACC with temporary facilities whilst we await the reconstruction of the amenities building and the construction of the new grandstand.

Council has advised that the complete reconstruction of the fire-damaged amenities building will proceed in 2017 with estimated completion by September 2017. Following confirmation by the Federal Government of the pledged \$2 million funding for the grandstand project preliminary concept plans have been prepared and accepted by Council and the project will now proceed through the processes of development approval, tender and construction with estimated completion to be advised.

Thanks again to our Football sponsors listed in the Annual Report booklet. Many of them have been with us for several years and without their generosity we could not provide the current professional level of football operations. Please support them where you can.

Once again our young Tigers have excelled taking out the Most Successful Junior Club on the Central Coast award for the fourth year in a row. 14 teams made the Finals, 7 teams made it through to the Grand Finals with 4 teams taking out premierships. A great achievement reflecting the depth of talent in our youngsters thanks to the Junior Committee, coaches and support staff.

During 2016 we sadly farewelled three distinguished members. Ted Hollier who was also a long time sponsor and Club supplier passed away earlier in the year and later we lost Bill Raby, a bowling stalwart and avid South Sydney supporter. Then in August Life Member Bill Atkins was taken after a short but courageous battle with cancer. Bill (aka "The General") earned his Life Membership for his dedication and tireless fundraising activities during the tough financial times of the 70's. I have fond memories of my association with Bill in his security role at the previous Tuggerah Lakes Memorial Club with such colourful characters as Mick O'Sullivan, Jim Stewart and Jim McCabe. To the families of all three I extend my deepest sympathy.

Finally to all our members please continue to enjoy our facilities and best wishes for a healthy and successful 2017.

## ACTING PRESIDENT'S report Vince Mitchell



Fellow Members.

I would like to start this report by informing you, the members, that in September your elected President succumbed to a serious illness which required him to be indefinitely hospitalized. David decided that he was unable to perform his required duties and would relinquish his position. Your Board determined that he be offered extended leave of absence until the next Annual General Meeting when, health permitting, he could re-nominate for any or all positions. In December Dave underwent major surgery at North Shore Private Hospital and, at time of writing, is undergoing intensive rehabilitation and therapy at Berkeley Vale Private Hospital. Dave is wished a full and speedy recovery and a return to the Board of the Club.

Your Board continues to remain stable with only one change with Michael Bates returning to the Board replacing Phil Andrews who retired to pursue his interest in touring.

The Club's membership continues to increase slowly overall with the total number of financial members at 30th September 2016 being 16,169 up from 15,925 the previous year.

Your Club continues to trade profitably. The net profit for this year amounted to \$744,640 compared to \$1,186,274 in year 2015 and \$523,181 in the 2014 financial year. Verbal reports from other clubs replicate this downturn in trading profits.

Your Club continues to be financially viable with total member's funds \$12,267,434 as at 30th September 2016 compared to \$11.522.794 in 2015. Total assets are valued at \$13,621,403 with current assets \$3,532,312 and non-current assets \$10.089.091. Current liabilities are \$1.159.405 and non-current liabilities \$194,564. This amount includes \$159.099 set aside for provisions (annual and long service leave payments).

The Club continues to be well directed and managed. Chief Executive Officer, Mark Chaffey is entering into his fifteenth year in this position. His experience and knowledge of the industry combined with his reputation amongst other C.E.O.s contributes hugely to the continued improvement and success of our Club. Mark is ably assisted by his Management Team and floor staff who, with smiling faces and friendly demeanor, are

responsible for making our members and guests feel appreciated and welcome.

The appointed Directors maintain their attendances at all Board and Membership meetings throughout the year. These Directors freely give up their time in their attempts to ensure that the Club continues to prosper.

The Club continues to support its affiliated clubs and sub clubs: The Entrance Rugby League Club, The Entrance Junior Rugby League Club, The Golden Hind Women's Bowling Club, The Men's Social Bowling Club, The Darts Club, The Tigers Netball Club and The Social Golf Club. Reports from these clubs appear in the printed Annual Report.

As part of the gaming tax formula clubs are required to donate to charities and charitable organizations as a minimum a percentage of gaming income for the year. These club grants are allocated through local authorities and as deemed by the club. A list of Club Grant recipients is contained in the Annual Report together with a list of Sporting Sponsorships for this year.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Board of Directors, Management and Staff we thank you our loyal members for your continued patronage and offer to you our best wishes for the upcoming 2017 year.

It is with pleasure to present my report to the Members of The Entrance Leagues Club for the year ending September 30th, 2016.

Your Club recorded an Operating Profit of \$744,640 compared to an Operating Profit of \$1,186,274 in the 2015 Financial Year.

Trading revenues decreased to \$13,990,316 compared to \$14,146,682, Membership increased to 16,169 from 15,925 and Depreciation and Amortisation increased to \$1,730,404 compared to \$1,642,964. Overall, your Club has continued to trade well in a very competitive market, finishing with a strong profit, a good cash flow and healthy cash reserves after paying out all Bank Loans throughout the 2016 Financial Year. Well done to all Members for the fantastic support you provide.

To the Board of Directors, firstly I welcome back David Hart, great to see you back to your old self and we look forward to you continuing on in the Chairman's role following your leave of absence in late 2016 early 2017. Special thanks to Vince Mitchell who stepped into the Chairman's role whilst David was on a leave of absence, well done Vince, you handled the role well and it was appreciated by all.

All of the Clubs Board of Directors' deserve a thank you for the way they contribute their time, knowledge and support towards the running of your Club: they all contribute in their own way and carry out their roles in a professional manner. The Board continues to plan for the Clubs future with regular Strategic Planning Meetings utilising industry professionals to assist with decision process and planning. Compulsory formal Director training for new and existing Board Members will continue in this ever changing and challenging Club Industry. As mentioned last year, the reduction in Board numbers has helped achieve a cohesive Board and I look forward to working with you all again in 2017.

Of course, the Club could not continue to achieve positive results in the current climate without great Management and Staff. I would like to

congratulate the entire team for their loyalty and service they provide our valued Members and Guests on a daily basis. The Club has a strong team of employees who can be relied upon to take care of our Members, our Facilities and our Future' all deserving a special mention in this report, refer page 36. Our Club has had a number of long serving employees leave over the past twelve months, who we wish all the best, along with congratulating their replacements who have stepped into these roles (majority promoted from within) with great enthusiasm and energy, making the transition as smooth as possible, well done to all. As mentioned the Club Industry is an ever changing industry, however' the importance of Clubs in their local community is something I always talk about, providing much needed financial assistance to so many community demographics, along with providing a safe and secure place to socialise for all ages. The Entrance Leagues Club will continue to prioritise this support and service in our planning processors, so please support your local Club to help achieve local outcomes.

Our Football Clubs, both Junior and Senior continue to set benchmarks both on and off the field, with our Seniors receiving the Best Administered Club Award in the Central Coast Rugby League in 2016 and our Juniors receiving the Most Successful Junior Club for the fourth year in a row in 2016. Great achievements, which reflect sound decision making, some decisions are not always easy, however' both awards reflect recognition from your peers and highlight that you can be a successful Club without the win at all costs mentality that tends to creep into some Clubs. This must continue to be maintained, a strong ethic on standards and decisions made on what's right for the Club and the Game.

Thank you to our Senior President Mick Bates and his Committee, 2016 was a tough year both on and off the field for various reasons, however' this will only help in the future and your efforts in ensuring a competitive Football Club are certainly

appreciated and I look forward to working with you again in 2017. Thanks also to Mat Watson who has stepped down as Junior President, well done for your efforts and we wish Nicole Edwards all the best in the Presidency role in 2017, along with her Committee.

The company's principal activities during the course of the financial year were the operation of a licensed club and to promote the game of rugby league football.

There were no significant changes in the nature of the company's activities during the financial year.

#### Membership

The Company is a company limited by guarantee and is without share capital. The number of members as at 30 September 2016 and the comparison with last year is as follows:

#### **Operating result**

The net profit for the year amounted to \$744,640 compared with \$1,186,274 in the prior year. This result was after charging \$1,730,404 (2015: \$1,642,964) for depreciation and amortisation.

#### **Objectives**

#### **Short-term Objectives**

The vision of the Board and Management is to run a successful business, to be profitable and financially sound, to retain a strong family atmosphere and provide family oriented facilities to the local community. An integral part of this vision is also to retain the personal touch that the Club has with its members and to continue to strive for customer service excellence. This is something that both the Board and Management believe will continue to give the Club a competitive edge as it continues to grow in membership numbers and size.

Be recognised in the community as a progressive and successful Club providing a significant contribution to the community as a whole.

#### **Long-term Objectives**

Continue to develop and refine the Club Master Plan, which incorporates, establishing a cyclical refurbishment plan, acquiring additional gaming entitlements, further food options, achieving energy efficiency, upgrading gaming software and implementing a venue wide loyalty programme. These long term objectives will be supported by undertaking continual research of the Club's Key markets to ensure that the Club has a competitive edge in its market. #### 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

#### **Basis of Preparation**

The Entrance Leagues Club (Reduced Disclosure Requirements) Limited has elected to early adopt the Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements as set out in AASB 1053: Application of Tiers of Australian Accounting Standards abs AASB 2010-2 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements. The company has also adopted AASB 2011-2: Amendments to the Australian Accounting Standards arising from the Trans-Tasman Convergence Project – Reduced Disclosure and AASB 2012-7: Amendments to the Australian Accounting Standards arising from Reduced Disclosure Requirements.

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. The company is a n ot-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards. Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

#### **Accounting Policies**

#### (a) Revenue

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised upon the delivery of goods to customers.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

When grant revenue is received whereby the entity incurs an obligation to deliver economic value directly back to the contributor, this is considered a reciprocal transaction and the grant revenue is recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until the service has been delivered to the contributor, otherwise the grant is recognised as income on receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

Donations are recognised as revenue when received.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

#### (b) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost. Inventories held for distribution are measured at cost adjusted, when applicable, for any loss of service potential.

#### (c) Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value as indicated, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Freehold Property

Freehold land is measured on the cost basis. Buildings are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

#### **Plant and Equipment**

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis and are therefore carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. In the event the carrying amount of plant and equipment is greater than its estimated recoverable amount, the carrying amount is written down immediately to the estimated recoverable amount and impairment losses are recognised either in profit or loss or as a revaluation decrease if the impairment losses relate to a revalued asset. A formal assessment of recoverable amount is made when the impairment indicators are present (refer to note 1(f) for details of impairment).

Plant and equipment that have been contributed at no cost are recognised at the fair value of the asset at the date it is acquired.

#### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets, including buildings and capitalised lease assets but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the asset's useful life to the

entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted if appropriate, at end of each reporting period.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which they arise. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation surplusw relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

#### (d) Leases

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) that are transferred to the entity, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised, recognising an asset and a liability equal to the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives where it is likely that the entity will obtain ownership of the asset. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period.

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight line basis over the lease term. Lease incentives under operating leases are recognised as a liability and amortised on a straight line basis over the life of the lease term.

#### (e) Financial Instruments

#### **Initial Recognition and Measurement**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the entity commits itself to either purchase or sell that asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transactions costs where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss" in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit and loss immediately.

#### **Classification and Subsequent Measurement**

Financial instruments are subsequently measured at fair value, amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, or cost. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Amortised cost is calculated as the amount at which the financial asset or financial liability is measured at initial recognition less principal repayments and reduction for impairment, and adjusted for any cumulative amortisation of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount calculated using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is used to allocate interest income or interest expense over the relevant period and is equivalent to the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments or receipts (including fees, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life (or when this cannot be reliably predicted, the contractual term) of the financial instrument to the net carrying amount of the financial asset or financial liability. Revisions to expected future net cash flows will necessitate an adjustment to the carrying amount with a consequential recognition of an income or expense item in profit or loss.

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including recent arm's length transactions, reference to simular instruments and option pricing models.

#### (i) Financial assets at fair value through Profit or loss

Financial assets are classified at "fair value through profit or loss" when they are held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking, derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance **Note 1**.

evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying amount being included in profit or loss.

#### (ii) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

#### (iii) Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial asset is derecognised.

#### (iv) Available-for-sale financial assets

Available-for-sale financial assets are non-derivative financial assets that are either not capable of being classified into other categories of financial assets due to their nature or they are designated as such by management. They comprise investments in the equity of other entities where there is neither a fixed maturity nor fixed or determinable payments.

They are subsequently measured at fair value with any remeasurements other than impairment losses and foreign exchange gains and losses recognised in other comprehensive income. When the financial asset is derecognised, the cumulative gain or loss pertaining to that asset previously recognised in other comprehensive income is reclassified into profit or loss.

Available-for-sale financial assets are classified as non-current assets when they are expected to be sold after 12 months from the end of the reporting period. All other available for sale financial assets are classified as current assets.

#### (v) Financial liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities other than financial guarantees are subsequently measured at amortised cost. Gains or losses are recognised in profit or loss through the amortisation process and when the financial liability is derecognised.

#### **Impairment**

At the end of each reporting period, the company assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset has been impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets will be deemed to be impaired if, and only if, there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of the occurrence of one or more events (a "loss event"), which as an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset(s).

#### Derecognition

Financial assets are derecognised where the contractual rights to receipt of cash flows expire or the asset is transferred to another party whereby the entity no longer has any significant continuing involvement in the risks and benefits associated with the asset. Financial liabilities are derecognised where the related obligations are discharged, cancelled or expired.

The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability, which is extinguished or transferred to another party, and the fair value of consideration paid, including the transfer of non-cash assets or liabilities assumed, is recognised in profit or loss.

#### (f) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount if an asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount.

Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit and loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (e.g. in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment or loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other standard. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. Impairment testing is performed annually for goodwill and intangible assets with indefinite lives.

#### (g) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. In determining the liability, consideration is given to employee wage increases and the probability

that the employee may not satisfy vesting requirements. Those cash outflows are discounted using market yields on national government bonds with terms to maturity that match the expected timing of cash flows.

#### (h) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short-term borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

#### (i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the

amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the statement of financial position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities which are recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO are presented as operating cash flows included in receipts from customers or payments to suppliers.

#### (j) Income Tax

The Company is exempt from income tax under section 23 (g) of the Income Tax Assessment act.

#### (k) Comparative Figures

When required by accounting standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

#### (I) Trade and other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liabilities for goods and services received by the company during the reporting period that remain unpaid at the end of the reporting period. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

#### (m) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The Directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the entity.

#### (n) Critical accounting estimates and judgements

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### (o) New accounting standards and interpretations

Certain new accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for 30 September 2016 reporting periods. The Company's assessment of the impact of these new standards and interpretations is that their adoption is not expected to have a material impact on future financial statements.

### **RESPONSIBLE** service of alcohol

### The Entrance Leagues Club Policy

It is necessary for this Club to practice responsible service of alcohol for community, legal and health reasons. Irresponsible use of alcohol leads to serious social problems including drunkenness, under age drinking, violence and drink driving.

### It is the policy of The Entrance Leagues Club:

- to respect a person's right to consume alcohol responsibly.
- to allow patrons present in the Club to enjoy themselves in a responsible manner.
- to prevent intoxication, violent or quarrelsome behaviour in or around the Club premises.
- to prevent excessive drinking of alcohol by individuals which place themselves, other patrons and the community at risk.
- to refuse service of alcohol to under age persons.

#### It is illegal for:

- a person on the Club's premises to sell or supply liquor to a person under the age of 18 years on the Club's premises.
- this Club's Licensee to permit intoxication or any indecent, violent or quarrelsome conduct on the Club's premises.
- a person on the Club's premises to sell or supply any liquor to any person on the Club's premises who is at the time intoxicated.
- a person who has been refused entry into the Club, or has been requested to leave the Club, because they are intoxicated, to refuse to quit the Club premises when requested to do so.

#### Intoxication

May be described as a state in which, through the consumption of alcohol, a person has severely lost the normal control of his or her bodily and mental faculties.

### **Preventing Intoxication**

The Entrance Leagues Club will take all reasonable steps to prevent intoxication on the Club's premises including:

- promoting low alcohol and non-alcoholic drinks
- encouraging patrons to have non-alcoholic drinks between rounds of alcoholic drinks
- promoting food sales
- refusal of service to persons apparently intoxicated

#### Preventing under age drinking

The Club staff will request proof of age from any person entering the Club, or present in the Club, who appears under age or if there is a doubt about the person being of legal age. The only proof of age acceptable are photo drivers license, proof of age card or passport.

### Understanding the Responsible Service of Alcohol Policy

This policy will be displayed throughout the Club and appear in the Club's Journal to ensure patrons are made aware of it. Any person wanting further information or explanation about it, including its implications for patrons, should contact the Duty Manager. All staff are given the opportunity to be trained so that they are made aware of their legal rights and obligations pertaining to responsible service of alcohol, of the provisions of the Club's Responsible Service of Alcohol Policy and the signs of intoxication.

### **Responsible Conduct of Gaming**

The Entrance Leagues Club is totally committed to the practice of Responsible Conduct of Gaming for community, legal and health reasons and to minmise harm and meet community expectations. The Entrance Leagues Club achieves its harm minimisation objective through its gambling operations by having in place a set of rules and procedures to ensure a pleasant and safe gambling environment. A copy of these rules is readily available at the Clubs Reception and is displayed throughout the Club.






